

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
between the Leon Valley Historical
Society and the City of Leon Valley

Town Hall Meeting
January 23, 2016

Purpose

- Form a partnership to work together on the restoration and eventual opening of a museum at the Huebner-Onion Homestead & Stagecoach Stop

Background Historical Society Property

- The Huebner Onion House is a two story structure along Bandera Road that dates to the 1850's
- It is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and also is listed as part of the Texas Historic Commission's new statewide Heritage Trail
- The Leon Valley Historical Society which manages the property is, a 501 (c) (3) non profit organization

Background Public Public Partnership (PPP)

- The First meeting to discuss the possibility of a partnership was August 29, 2015, and open to the public
 - Master Plan Presentation by the Leon Valley Historical Society
 - Initial feelers to gauge the public's response –which was positive for the PPP
- Second meeting to discuss the PPP was held on November 7, 2015, and was open to the public
 - A survey was given and the majority of the respondents supported a PPP between the City and the Historical Society

The Roles and Responsibilities of the Partnership agreement

Leon Valley Historical Society

- Compile funding sources
- Apply for funding for the Heritage center & Triangle park
- Work in conjunction with the Leon Valley Economic Development Board and the Leon Valley Chamber of Commerce to spur economic development in the Heritage and Triangle park area
- Work in conjunction with the Northside Independent School District to develop curriculum and tour packages for local students
- Staff the potential heritage center as needed and/or as funding permits

The City of Leon Valley

- Assist the project through the use of the 36 acre natural area
- Provide a designated parking area for museum
- Maintain the grounds and facility of the 36 acre natural area and the Huebner Onion Homestead
- Work in conjunction with the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) to facilitate a curb cut for entrance to the Huebner Onion Homestead during the 2016 calendar year
- Present a budget request to the Leon Valley City Council for consideration of matching funds, if necessary, for the project on future grant applications





How many Officers are on patrol at any given time?







- The Police Department has been unable to fill 3 Officer vacancies


Solutions to Issue Number 4 Personnel

- Continue to advertise and fill vacancies







Brainstorming and Possible Solutions


- The hiring of 2 additional Police Officers for FY 15 and FY 16 may assist with possible solutions to previously listed issues
 - One position was filled in July 2015
 - One to be filled in January 2016
 - Two existing vacancies will be filled at this time as well
 - A third position is planned for FY 2017
 - Funding coming from the Crime Prevention and Control District

 - Software that will enable the Officers to type and then transmit their reports from the field
 - Currently hand writing reports
- Other means of traffic calming on Evers Road
 - Use of speed trailer

Purpose

- To raise awareness that Leon Valley may lose a valuable recreational resource, if steps are not taken to improve the future of the Forest Oaks Pool.

Note: In the paragraphs that follow, the “Forest Oaks Pool” will refer to all the amenities on the property, as well as the main pool.

Background

- Clubhouse, pools, and grounds were built in 1966 to attract home-buyers and businesses
- Builders deeded the property to the Forest Oaks Community Association (FOCA) in 1972
- Property was transferred for a one-time charge of \$40.00

Background (Cont.)

- FOCA is not a home owners' association.
 - Cannot assess fees
 - Cannot impose property restrictions on the subdivision
- Except for major repairs and improvements, FOCA has been maintained (and managed) by unpaid volunteers for 43+ years.

Background (cont.)

- In 2014, the former city council voted 3-2 to drop fees for use of the Leon Valley Pool to \$0.00
 - The council also approved a contract to hire a private company to manage the pool for an annual fee of \$40,000
 - The pool had previously been managed by neighborhood volunteers.
- In 2015, the Forest Oaks Pool memberships dropped 16.0%
- With a similar drop in 2016, the Forest Oaks Pool may no longer be financially viable
- The ongoing financial viability of FOCA is not the only problem

Volunteerism

- As with many volunteer organizations, volunteerism ebbs and flows
- Leon Valley (LV) is first and foremost a working population
 - Our workers have ever-greater demands at home and at work
- LV and the surrounding areas also have aging populations.
 - Older citizens cannot handle many of the physical demands of maintaining a clubhouse, two pools and adjoining grounds.

Volunteerism (Cont.)

- We are sincerely indebted to Tom and Lori Kelley and many others, who have shouldered the enormous responsibility of operating and maintaining the Forest Oaks Pool for the last 10 years.
- Rightfully so, the Kelley's wish to significantly decrease their Forest Oaks Pool responsibilities in 2016.
- They have indicated a strong willingness to assist others who might wish to take over their responsibilities.

Volunteerism (Cont.)

- The FOCA Board has made earnest attempts over many months to fill critical volunteer positions involving finance (Lori) and maintenance (Tom).
- These attempts have been totally unsuccessful.
- Sufficient volunteerism has been vital to the success of the Forest Oaks Pool, as have new memberships and renewals.
- Without these elements, or assistance from outside sources (i.e. the City), the Forest Oaks Pool may close during the 2016 season.

Finances and Facilities

- Finances: FOCA is totally solvent at this time; however, FOCA's ability to pay its new bills is determined by its number of new memberships and renewals.
- Facilities: All facilities are currently in good condition.

Value Added

Economic Impact

- If the Forest Oaks Pool remains open, it will continue to:
 - Attract homebuyers and businesses
 - Provide income to local lifeguards, coaches, etc.
- If the Forest Oaks Pool closes, it will cause:
 - A community eyesore
 - A possible increase in property (and other) crimes
 - A possible decrease in home values
 - Overcrowding at the Leon Valley Pool


Picture of a Closed Pool






Background

- Feb 2014 - City Council made a final decision on trail alignment for Phase 1
- Feb 2015 – received approval from TxDOT and authorization to advertise bid for construction
- April 2015 – TxDOT halted construction based on Native American artifacts located on the property
- June 2015 - City Council delays construction of trail until Flood Control LC-17 Phase III project is completed & alternative trail route in Phase 1 determined
 - City Council directed that alternative routes, timeline for development, and cost analysis to be discussed at the January 2016 Town Hall meeting


Background

- Sept 2015 - City Council requests of the MPO that the portion of trail to be constructed be changed from the Evers - Bandera portion (Phase 1) to the Bandera Road - Shadow Mist portion (Phase 2), to move forward with connection to the City of San Antonio's planned Crystal Hills Trailhead
- Oct 2015 – MPO approves change and places trail in the FY 2017 TIP budget, with Phase 2 to be constructed with allocated funds (\$933,000)
- Present – change under review at Federal level, but expected to be approved

- Funding of trail approved by Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), funded by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), oversight through the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) at \$933,000
 - 80/20 match
- Construction costs for Phase 2 is estimated to be approximately \$1,218,123
- City portion would be 20% (construction only) or approximately \$243,625

Fiscal Impact

- Phase 2 (section below Bandera Road bridge) must wait until BCFC LC-17 project is complete and City receives the land
 - BCFC has not commenced construction
- Construction costs may have increased/decreased for Phase 1
- Engineering costs already budgeted, but plans not in development, due to BCFC changes in Huebner Creek for LC-17

S.E.E. Statement

- Social Equity - A Hike & Bike Trail provides additional outdoor recreation opportunities for all citizens
- Economic Development – Maintaining attractive recreational resources provides additional incentive for citizens and businesses to relocate or stay in Leon Valley
- Environmental Stewardship - A Hike & Bike Trail is a prudent use of natural resources and assures the highest and best use of our floodplain/way properties


