LEON VALLEY BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

(Fiscal Year: 10/1/2022 – 9/30/23)

One of the major responsibilities of the city council is to set the property tax rate which generates ad valorem taxes to help pay for all the city services you receive (police, fire, EMS, public works, library, parks, court, city administration, code/animal enforcement).

A major goal of the city council in setting the budget for 2023 was to bring our employees' salaries up to average pay in the area. We were losing experienced employees to other agencies due to pay issues. This goal is met in this year's budget.

The council discussed the tax rate at length and adopted the tax rate at the September 20th council meeting. With property appraisals increasing an average of 19%, the prior tax rate of 0.534 cents per \$100 valuation could be reduced

to a tax rate of 0.484 cents, to keep revenues the same as last year (the no-new-revenue or NNR rate).

City Manager Caldera recommended the city council adopt the NNR tax rate of \$0.484 cents per \$100 valuation because the money generated would cover the basic services of the city, including substantial increases in salary and merit pay for all employees (\$879,222).

After a robust debate among council members over three meetings, the council majority (Councilors Stevens, Hefner, Orozco and Bradshaw) voted to adopt the no new revenue tax rate of \$0.484 cents per \$100 valuation, which is a significant reduction from last year's tax rate. Councilor Martinez voted no. This budget will still raise more revenue from commercial and residential property taxes than last year's budget by an amount of \$322,774 or 6.14%.

At the end of the budget process, the council amended the budget to add one police officer (\$85,000), bringing the total employees in the police department to 41, and to provide a 2% Cost of Living increase to all employees beginning January 1, 2023

(\$185,159), both to be paid from the American Rescue (ARP) funds.

What is the effect of the new tax rate on the average homeowner in Leon Valley? The average home value in 2021 was \$217,912, which increased in 2022 to \$259,591. The average Leon Valley property tax paid in 2021 was \$1,120. With the adopted tax rate of \$0.484, the average taxes paid in 2022 will be \$1,118, an annual decrease of \$2. If you are over 65, your property value and tax rate are frozen at the amount you paid at age 64.

Some other highlights in this year's budget of over \$25 million (including general fund, water, sewer and stormwater funds):

- **1.** Also, added one detective to the Police Department.
- **2.** Added a full-time Custodial employee in place of using a contractual service.
- **3.** Some notable capital projects in this year's budget:
- \$100,000 for Linkwood sidewalks;
- \$200,000 for the Hike & Bike Trail, segment II;
- \$70,000 for a Skate Park on

Shadow Mist at Crystal Hills park (from American Rescue funds (ARP);

- \$250,000 to replace sewer mains; and
- \$800,000 for a new fire truck, ½ paid down from ARP funds, and the remaining balance financed for five years.
- 4. The \$50,000 cost to conduct a staffing level assessment was not budgeted. This study would have determined the number of staff needed in police, fire/EMS and public works through an independent analysis. This study may be funded later through ARP funds.

Our city remains in excellent fiscal condition. Our General Reserve fund is approximately \$ 3.1 million. Sales tax revenues are projected at \$3.3 million, up from \$2.9 million budgeted in 2022.

Special thanks to City Manager Dr. Crystal Caldera, Finance Director Kevin Rule, Assistant Finance Director Yvonne Acuna, and all department heads for preparing a budget which is balanced and meets the needs of our city for the next fiscal year. The FY 2023 budget is online and very detailed. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to call.

HOME RULE CHARTER PROPOSITIONS PASSED

All 13 propositions which were unanimously proposed by City Council and voted on by the citizens of Leon Valley in the November 8th election, passed. The lowest margin was 55.96% (Proposition D – deleted the requirement that a council member forfeit their

office if violating the charter) and the highest margin was 70.84% (Proposition J – the City Attorney shall be appointed by the City Council, and report to the Council).

These changes to the Charter eliminated the Section 3.12 hearing process, which led to 3 years of council infighting and cost taxpayers huge amounts of attorney fees and staff time (Props. B, D, F & M). The amendments further clarify 1) that the city manager works for the City Council and has the same executive powers & duties as the city manager had before the Charter was adopted (Props. A, E, G, H. I & J); 2) confirm the basic principle that "All powers of the City shall be vested in Council" (Props. A, I, K, & L); and 3) restores the Mayor's ability to speak on any matter before the Council (Prop C).

No official tabulations are available at the time of this writing, but based on the unofficial tabulations I received, there were approximately 3,700 total votes cast, a 49% turnout rate (based on 7500 registered voters in Leon Valley). Thanks to everyone for your participation in this democratic process.

DID YOU KNOW?

AMAZON HUB LOCKER-

Thanks to the initiative of Councilman Josh Stevens, the City of Leon Valley has been designated as an Amazon Hub Locker in time for the holiday season! The self-service locker will be located at City Hall's main entrance at 6400 El Verde Rd. to the right-hand side of the doors. Instead of having a package delivered to your home or business address, you can have

it delivered to city hall and collect your package at a time that best fits your schedule. Amazon will send you a delivery confirmation email with instructions on how to pick up at the Locker. Collect your packages within three calendar days. If you don't pick up your packages within this time, Amazon will take back the package and give you a refund. The City will collect sales tax on the products delivered.

- COMING SOON: Our city's own Leon Valley App which citizens can download and use to communicate with City Hall on any issue you may have. This App when activated, will help take the place of ON-IT, used to report code and other violations. More details will be forthcoming.

Holiday Decorating

- Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.
- Turn off light strings when going to bed or leaving the house.

- Test smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away
 from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Blow out lit candles when going to bed.

Keeping it Fresh! Huebner Elevated Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation Project

All four of the City's water tanks are inspected in March of each year, as mandated by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). At its last inspection, both the interior and exterior of the Huebner Elevated Water Storage Tank were found to be in fair condition. Water tank rehabilitations typically last fifteen years and this tank was last rehabilitated in 2001.

The project was bid in September and in November, the City Council awarded the bid to Tankez Coatings in the amount of \$312,000. The project is scheduled to begin in December of 2022, as this is time of year our customers use the least amount of water. Once completed, all of the tanks will have been newly rehabilitated and good to go for another 15 years!

HAPPY TRAILS!! Huebner Creek Greenway Hike & Bike Trail Segment 1

The City Council awarded a bid to TCL Construction Enterprises, LLC in the amount of \$986,220 to construct the first segment of the Huebner Creek Greenway Trail in Leon Valley. The trail will run from Shadow Mist Drive (off Grissom Road) to just under the Bandera Road bridge near the end of El Verde Road. The trail will connect



to the City of San Antonio's Crystal Hills trailhead on Shadow Mist. TCL Construction expects to start construction in January of 2023 and hopes to complete the project by this time next year, weather permitting.

Linkwood Addition – Pavona Place Trail

At the end of Evers Road (near Huebner Road), there is an old, abandoned trail that was originally developed in the early 1990's. The trail surface has almost disappeared, and the trees and other vegetation got so overgrown that the trail was forgotten. Last year, the Public Works Department cleared most of the vegetation out of the way and installed an outdoor fitness station near the alley that separates Linkwood from Pavona. Quotes have been received to install a cedar split rail fence and once installed, we will resurface the entire length of the trail. This will connect the Linkwood Addition and Pavona Place neighborhoods and provide the Linkwood residents a way to get to Raymond Rimkus Park without having to drive. We expect completion of the improvements in February of 2023. Just a reminder that sewer rate averaging takes place from November to March, so please use the least amount of water as possible during this period (and remind members of your household to do the same!), to keep your sewer rates low for the next year.

Winter Prep – Protect the Pipes!

October and November are the best months to prepare your home for the sometimesfreezing South Texas winter. Wrap exposed pipes, insulate pipes that run along exterior walls, cover all outside spigots, and replace any damaged or missing weather strips. Other items to consider for your winter preparations include:

- Have your heating system inspected
- Install a carbon monoxide (CO) detector in your home
- Assure your smoke detectors are in good working order
- Clean out gutters and repair any roof leaks
- Have the chimney cleaned and inspected
- Have a safe alternative heating source at the ready
