## UPDATE: SUPERFUND SITE COMMUNITY ADVISORY GROUP (CAG)

2004, "contaminants of concern"

were discovered in the groundwater and indoor air at Savings Square shopping center. Several contaminants including tetrachloroethene (PCE), trichloroethene (TCE), dichloroethane (DCE), vinyl chloride, and toluene were found to have leaked into groundwater from a former dry cleaning business in Savings Square and the former Pilgrim Cleaners, both on Bandera Road. In 2007, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) listed Leon Valley as a Superfund site and the Community Advisory Group (CAG) was formed. After the contamination was discovered, several private wells were tested. Those found to be impacted were plugged and affected homes were connected to a public water supply. The City of Leon Valley public water supply wells have been tested for the above chemicals numerous times and testing has always indicated the water is safe to drink. After EPA completed its remedial investigation in 2012, EPA issued its Record of Decision in 2013. In 2016, a Remedial Design was initiated and was completed by November

2020. What this means is EPA has developed a process to clean up this superfund site with the highest regard for safety of the public, property owners, staff and subcontractors. The contract duration is five years (2023 - 2028). There will be a multi-pronged approach to cleaning up this site. Funding for the cleanup has come from the private responsible parties and the federal government. ## LEON VALLEY GREENWAY HIKE AND BIKE TRAIL

On January 5th, a groundbreaking ceremony was held at the end of El Verde road for Phase one of the new Leon Valley Greenway Hike & Bike trail. The trail is being funded through an 80% construction reimbursement grant to the City through the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization. Total cost (without change orders) is \$988,220. The trail will connect with the City of San Antonio's trail system at Crystal Hills trailhead located off of Shadow Mist and will run along El Verde Road, along Huebner Creek, eventually going under the Bandera Road bridge to connect with the sidewalk that leads to the Huebner-Onion Homestead. The contractor, TCl Construction, estimated it will take six months to build, weather and materials permitting. A future reimbursement grant has also been approved to extend this trail from Bandera Road bridge

through the CPS easement and along the fire break in the Natural Area through Raymond Rimkus park to Evers Road at Poss Road. Construction for this portion of the trail will begin in 2024. This is a great quality of life improvement for all our citizens. Thanks to the City Council, Melinda Moritz, Public Works director, the Hike & Bike Committee, engineers from the Ardurra Group and TXDOT District Engineers for helping this project become reality!

- New "Kraken variant" -XBB.1.5 – is the latest strain of COVID to be detected in the states and Texas. 
The last day for to Register to Vote is Thursday, April 06, 2023.

## **Leon Valley Economic Development**

The City Council of Leon Valley has established a program to provide assistance to households and residents in Leon Valley in an effort to mitigate the financial burden and continuing effects caused by Covid-19. The program will be administered by Ascension DePaul Services.



Grants administered under the Utility Assistance Program shall meet the following parameters:

- Utilities shall mean and be defined as; Electricity, Natural Gas, Water, Sewer, and Sanitation Services Recipients of funds shall be residents of Leon Valley, Texas.
- Disbursements and assistance must be directly associated with and are necessary expenditures incurred as a result of partial or complete loss of income.
- Accounts MUST be 45 days overdue. Payments are made directly to the service company. No reimbursements are paid.



## TEVING WITH WILDLIFE IN LEON VALUET

There are many different species of wild animals that reside in and around Leon Valley. On a typical day residents may encounter deer, coyotes, armadillos, porcupines, opossums, raccoons, skunks, snakes, rats, mice, feral cats, or dogs. Often, these animals may seem quiet, reserved, and docile, while other times they are aggressive and agitated. Please refrain from touching or getting near these animals, because not

only are they wild, but some may be carriers of rabies and may attack


without warning. Fawns are often left by does on the ground for hours and should not be picked up or removed. This is normal wildlife behavior. Do not interfere.


Protect yourself, your family, and our resident wildlife in the following ways:

1. Do not feed wild animals. This includes ensuring that any food or water set out for your domestic pets is removed promptly. Deer corn, bread, and tortillas are not a good treat for deer and

corn, bread, and tortillas are not a good treat for deer and should not be made available to them at any time.

- **2.** Never discard edible food onto your premises.
- **3.** Secure all outside garbage containers with tight fitting lids.
- **4.** Do not allow junk, debris, old tired, high weeds, and brush piles to accumulate on your property at any time.
- 5. Keep pet doors securely closed at night.
- **6.** Block any openings in fences or buildings with wire, wire mesh, concrete, or wood
- 7. The Texas Wildlife Commission recommends placing moth balls around your fence line or in various parts of your yard, or soaking rags and old socks in ammonia and placing them around your fence line and/or yard, especially at night, to keep snakes, skunks, armadillos, opossums, rats, and mice at bay. The Texas Wildlife Commission urges animal control officials not to trap or relocate wildlife out of their natural environment; therefore, officers will not respond to wildlife calls, unless it is a dangerous situation requiring immediate action. Residents must call a private company or contractor that is trained,





If you are injured by wildlife, please call 911 and get medical attention immediately, and then report the incident to Leon Valley Animal Control. For questions or to report an incident, please call the Leon Valley Animal Control Office at 210-684-1391 ext. 229 or ext. 230.



Residents

are responsible for picking up dead animals on their properties, except deer. Dead animals should be placed in a trash bag and placed at the curb, and Tiger Sanitation contacted for pick-up at (210) 333-4287. Dead deer or animals on the roadway will be handled by Animal Control/Public Works after notification.
