NEW AGENDA POSTING REQUIREMENTS

House Bill No. 1522 amended the Government Code regarding the notice requirements for meetings under the open meetings law, effective September 1, 2025. The bill changed the notice posting requirements from a minimum of 72 hours to at least three business days before the scheduled meeting date, excluding weekends and holidays. Additionally, if the budget will be discussed or adopted in a meeting, the posted agenda must include a taxpayer impact statement comparing the current and upcoming fiscal year's property tax bills for median-valued homestead properties. The changes aim to enhance transparency and accessibility of budget-related information to the public. The posting of the agenda and related materials will now occur earlier than Friday afternoon, usually on Wednesday.

16TH ANNUAL TOWN HALL MEETING

Saturday, January 24th , 2026

Our tentative agenda will begin with City Manager Dr. Crystal

Caldera's summary of the progress made on goals and issues discussed from the January, 2025 Town Hall Meeting. **TOPICS:** a) A presentation on the *State of Texas Emergency Registry* (STEAR). This program is for anyone who may need some form of assistance during times of an emergency/disaster event. Registration for STEAR is free, and alerts local first responders that you may need help. b) TXDOT will give an update on the *Bandera Road redevelopment* project with schematics. The project is almost shovel ready (all elements of the project completed) and was expected to begin construction on Phase 1 (Leon Valley) in the 3rd Quarter, 2028. However, we have been notified that because many TXDOT projects need money for construction, our project could be delayed for several years. c) *Infrastructure Projects Update*. The City Manager will present and solicit citizen input on prioritizing what city infrastructure projects should be funded, with costs associated. We will use the tool Mentimeter to measure responses, so please bring your phone. d) We will conclude our meeting, with a *Citizens to Be*



Heard portion at the end of the meeting. This is **YOUR** opportunity to let the Council know what your priorities/concerns for the city are. All citizens will receive a postcard with the final agenda in early January. Meeting starts at 8:30 am and will include a light breakfast. Hope to see you there!

FYI – *Quarterly Coffees with the Mayor and City Council* are scheduled on the 4th Saturday morning in April, July and October at 9 am in the Conference Center to hear from citizens and to present specific information, like the budget, in a more informal setting.

we ended up approving the FY 25-26 budget:

June 3rd, June 19th and July 26th

– The City Manager presented a budget which initially reflected a deficit of \$1.3 million. Over the next two budget meetings, the deficit was reduced to \$250,797. The City Council and manager made difficult cuts to reflect the decreases realized (annual 4th of July celebration was eliminated).

August 5th – The city received the no-new revenue rate of \$.505 from Bexar Appraisal District, which would generate approximately the same tax revenue as last year. When applying this rate to our proposed budget, the city still had a deficit of approximately \$47,000. The Council directed the manager to raise the tax rate a full penny to \$.515, which erased the deficit with a surplus of approximately \$64,000.

August 19th – Keeping the tax rate at \$.515, the council allocated the surplus of \$64,000 to fire department repairs, park maintenance and a mass notification system. The Council also appropriated \$475,000 from the estimated \$5.7 million reserve fund for future capital needs.

September 2nd – The 2nd read for adopting the FY 25-26 tax rate at \$.515 per \$100 valuation was scheduled for a vote. At this meeting, the city manager informed the Council of Senate Bill 10, pending in the special legislative session. This bill would cap the property tax rate increase at 1% rather than the current 3.5%, which would mean your governing body could

not raise taxes over 1% in future years without voter approval. Assuming SB10 would become law, the Council directed the manager to increase the tax rate an additional three cents to \$.545, for a total of a six-cent increase from the current FY24-25 tax rate of \$.484, generating \$347,000 more in property taxes. This was to primarily hire 3 new firefighters. The manager then re-figured the budget at this rate to present to city council and the public on September 16th.

September 3rd – The next day, the city manager informed the council that SB 10 died before the special legislative session ended and was not voted into law, so the 1% restriction would not apply in the near future.

September 16th- The manager presented the FY25-26 budget at the \$.545 rate. Councilor Heyl and I advocated to go back to the initial decision to raise the tax rate to \$.515 rather than raise to \$.545. Our concern was the impact on family budgets, including rising cost of food, health care and an increase in water and sewer fees beginning October 1st. Councilors Bolton, Campos, Orozco and Mursch voted to raise the tax rate to \$.545 citing the need to hire three firefighters as recommended by the staff utilization study several years ago.

September 20th – The sole purpose of this meeting was to conduct a second reading on setting the tax rate for FY25-26 city budget, as required by the city charter. After Council heard from citizens who were in attendance, Councilor Heyl moved to approve a tax rate of \$.515. I also supported keeping

the tax rate at \$.515, but I do not have a vote, so her motion died for a lack of a second.

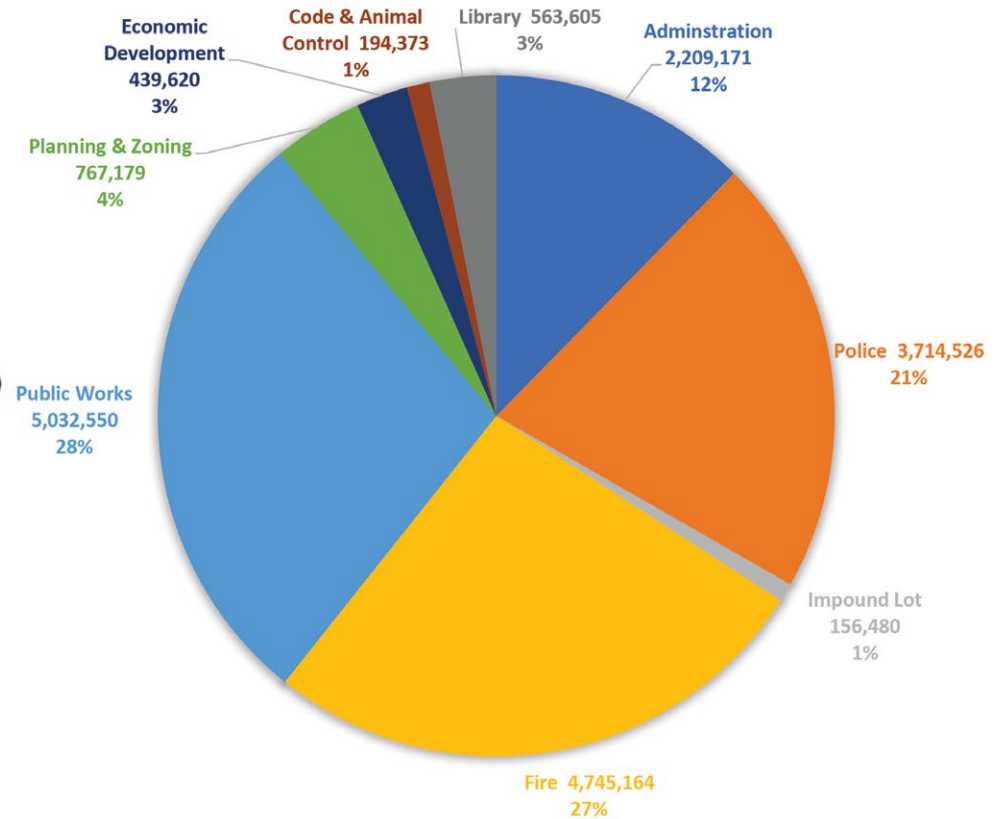
As Mayor, I then asked if there was another motion on the tax rate and Councilor Bolton moved to adopt a tax rate of \$.525 as a compromise that would enable the council to hire one firefighter rather than three. Councilor Heyl seconded the motion. The vote was (2) Ayes (Bolton & Heyl) and (3) Nays (Campos, Orozco & Mursch), so the motion failed.

A third motion was made by Councilor Orozco and seconded by Councilor Mursch to adopt a tax rate of \$.545 for FY 25-26. The votes were (2) Nays (Bolton & Heyl) and (3) Ayes (Campos, Orozco & Mursch), so the motion passed.

With the tax rate of \$.545, it is estimated the homeowner will pay an additional \$169.30 a year for a home's average value of \$230,620. Homeowners over age 65 will not have to pay this increase. Homeowners received their property tax bill for FY 25-26 in October. Your home's taxes are assessed for the period of January 1st – December 31, 2025 at this new rate. Payments are due by January 31, 2026 with the exception of split or quarter pay accounts.

On the next couple pages are three charts to show the budget in a different way. This was one of the most challenging budget processes I have experienced. If you have any questions, please contact your elected officials or the city manager.

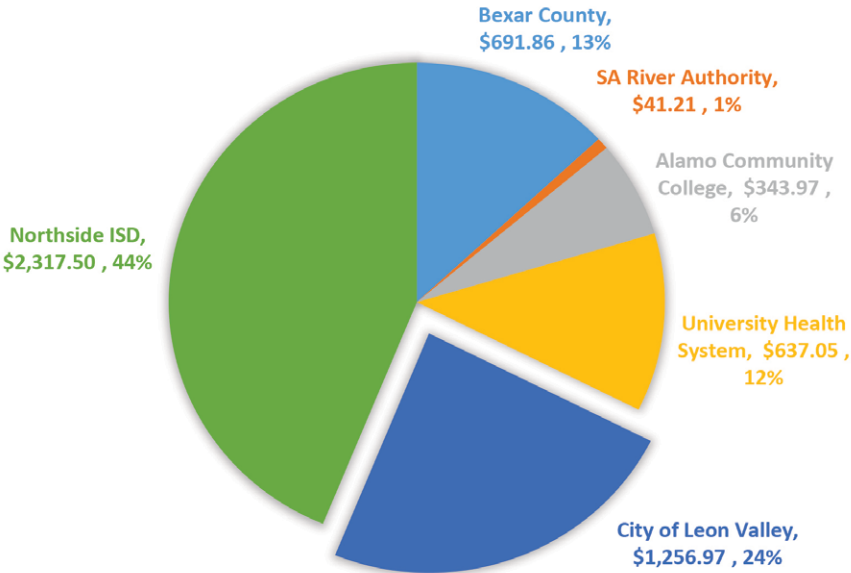
General Fund Expenditures by Department

Breakdown of Tax Year 2025 Homeowner Tax Bill

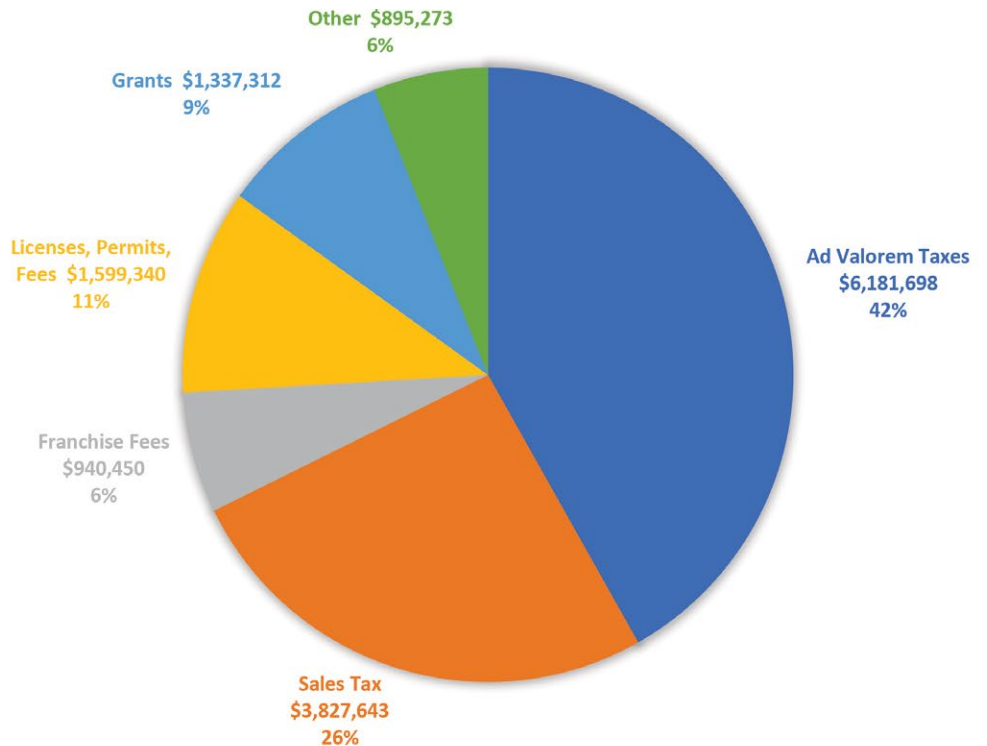

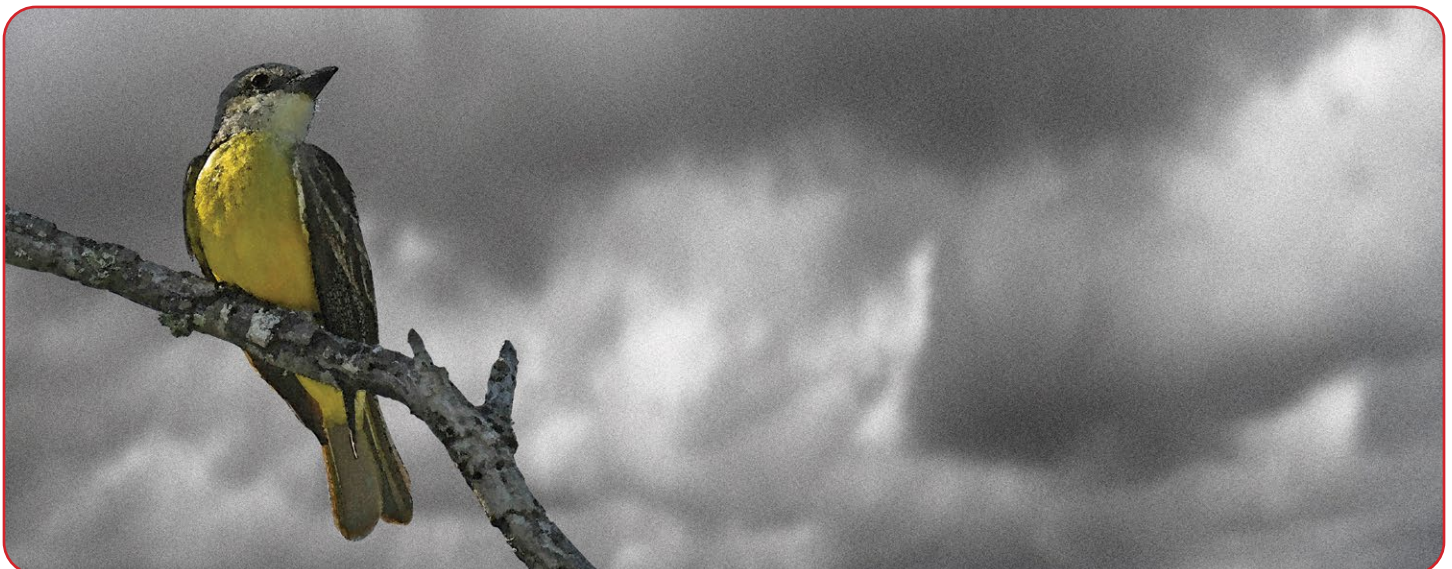

Jury Duty: A Civic Responsibility

Receiving a jury summons may not be exciting, but it's one of the most important civic duties. Jurors are randomly selected from lists of registered voters using court management software. While optional exemptions exist, attendance is **mandatory in every state**. This is one obligation you can't skip. Employers are legally required to allow employees time off for jury service.



A Judge will address all jury candidates and explain the case. Attorneys on both sides then ask questions to ensure jurors are fair and impartial – a process called voir dire. It's required to answer truthfully to avoid the risk of penalty of perjury, the crime of lying under oath. Based on responses, the attorney or defendant may dismiss jurors through up to three strikes, also known as peremptory challenges. Some jurors may be dismissed without explanation. The process continues until the necessary number of jurors and in some cases, a few alternates are left. The remaining jury members take an oath and are formally named that case's jury.

As a juror, you are a silent observer of the trial proceedings. You'll listen to both sides' opening statements, be presented with evidence, and listen to everything being said to end with the closing arguments. At the end of the trial, the Judge will instruct the jury on how to reach the final verdict, known as deliberation. One juror, chosen as the foreperson, leads these discussions.

As a juror, it is essential that you remain open-minded and base opinions only on the evidence. Remember, you're not "picking a side" but are an impartial third party to decide the truth with a verdict of guilty or not guilty. In the municipal court, which handles class C misdemeanors, the verdict must be unanimous. **You alone** determine what the facts are and if the defendant is guilty or not guilty. The final decision, signed by the jury, is then delivered to the court.

So why serve? Because it's mandatory. Think of it as paying it forward: if you were ever in court, you'd want your case decided by fair and thoughtful citizens. Jury duty allows you to exercise and protect the Sixth Amendment right to a trial by jury. Failure to appear can result in being held in contempt of court and fined \$100.00. The court would rather have your cooperation than issue penalties.

Jury duty connects us as citizens. It's one of the few direct ways you can participate in your government. Jury service is a fundamental right that is guaranteed to all citizens and is one of the very important aspects of our Democracy. When you receive a jury summons, see it as a unique opportunity to see the justice system in action and to contribute to the fair administration of the law. Your service truly matters.

The Leon Valley City Council recently adopted the following ordinances:

Ordinance No. 2025-21 - An ordinance of the City of Leon Valley, TX., City Council granting a Specific Use Permit to allow Construction and Operation of a Telecommunication Antennae/Tower in a B-3 Commercial Zoning District, located at 6004 Grissom Road; and more specifically described as Lot 4, CB 5955, Leon Valley Ranches Subdivision – Adopted 09-16-2025

Ordinance No. 2025-22 - An ordinance of the City of Leon Valley, TX., City Council adopting the Annual Budget for the City of Leon Valley for the Fiscal Year 2026; approving projects included in the plans; appropriating funds and providing for payment – Adopted 09-16-2025

Ordinance No. 2025-23 - An ordinance establishing and adopting for the purpose of taxation for the calendar year 2025 and Fiscal Year 2026; levying a tax of \$0.497818 for Maintenance and Operations and \$0.047222 for the Interest and Sinking Fund for a total tax rate of \$0.545040 on all property subject to taxation and situated in the City of Leon Valley, Texas, on the first day of January 2025; Establishing the rate of said levy; determining due date, delinquent date, interest rates on delinquencies, and for penalties for delinquencies; and determining and enacting other matters pertinent, necessary and incident to the subject – Adopted 09-20-2025

Ordinance No. 2025-24 - An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Leon Valley, Texas amending the Enterprise Fund Budget of the City of Leon Valley, Texas Municipal Budget for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 in a total amount of \$910,894 to provide funding for the Leon Valley Enterprise Fund for the El Verde Road Water and Drainage Improvements Project, and awarding the lowest qualified bid in the amount of \$724,718.83 with \$108,708 for contingency (15%), and authorizing the City Manager to enter into a contract with D&D Construction, Inc. for the El Verde Road Water and Drainage Improvements Project – Adopted 11-04-2025

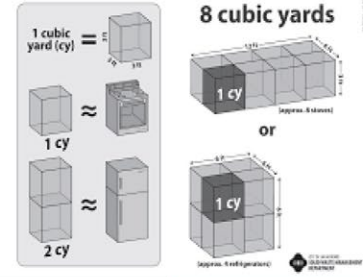

Heads Up, Leon Valley Residents!

Important Changes to Large Item (Bulk) Pickup

City Council recently approved updates to the rules for large item pickup to help keep our neighborhoods cleaner and ensure everyone receives consistent service.



Important Reminder About Tree Trimming

If you hire a commercial tree service, they are required to remove all limbs, branches, and trunks they cut. Please make sure they haul away their debris—items left by contractors should not be placed out for bulk pickup.

→ What's Changing?

Large item pickup will still take place twice a year, but there is now a strict limit of 8 cubic yards of acceptable items per household. This is the same amount allowed in the City's contract with Tiger Sanitation.

In the past, many homes placed out much larger piles—often from large tree trimming jobs. This caused residents to be charged extra by Tiger Sanitation for going over the limit. The City had temporarily been covering these costs, but we will no longer be able to do so.



When Does This Start?

The new rules take effect with the Spring 2026 Large Item Pickup, scheduled for February 23–28, 2026.

Residents will be responsible for any overage charges billed by Tiger Sanitation or another hauler. If extra items remain at the curb for more than 10 days after the event, the City will remove them and charge the property owner or renter. Unpaid charges may result in a privileged lien being placed on the property.

Huebner Creek Greenway Hike & Bike Trail Segment 2

City staff and the City Engineer have submitted the 100% engineering plans for the Huebner Creek Greenway Trail Segment 2 to TxDOT, and we expect to advertise for construction bids in January of 2026. The trail will connect to the Segment 1 trail just under the Bandera Road bridge near the end of El Verde Road and then run through the Huebner-Onion Natural Area Park and Raymond Rimkus Park to Evers Road. Segment 1 of the trail starts at the end of Shadow Mist St. and connects to the City of San Antonio's Leon Creek Greenway Hike & Bike Trail.



WINTER SEWER AVERAGING

Just a quick reminder that sewer rate averaging takes place from November to March, so please use the least amount of water as possible during this period (and remind members of your household to do the same!), to keep your sewer rates low for the next year.

LEON VALLEY OFFERS FREE HOME WATER AUDITS

What is Home Water Audit?

A Home Water Audit is an assessment of how much water is being used and how much water can be saved in your home. Conducting a water audit involves checking for running water when all faucets, etc. are turned off, calculating water use, and identifying simple ways for saving water in the home. Utility Crew Staff will meet with you at your home and inspect toilets, water softeners, and irrigation lines, for leaks.

What are the Benefits of conducting a Home Water Audit?

Having a home water audit performed may help you save money by reducing your water usage, making you aware of how you use your water, and helping to identify methods for minimizing water usage by implementing simple conservation measures without drastically modifying your lifestyle.

WINTER PREP - Protect the Pipes, People, Pets, and Plants!

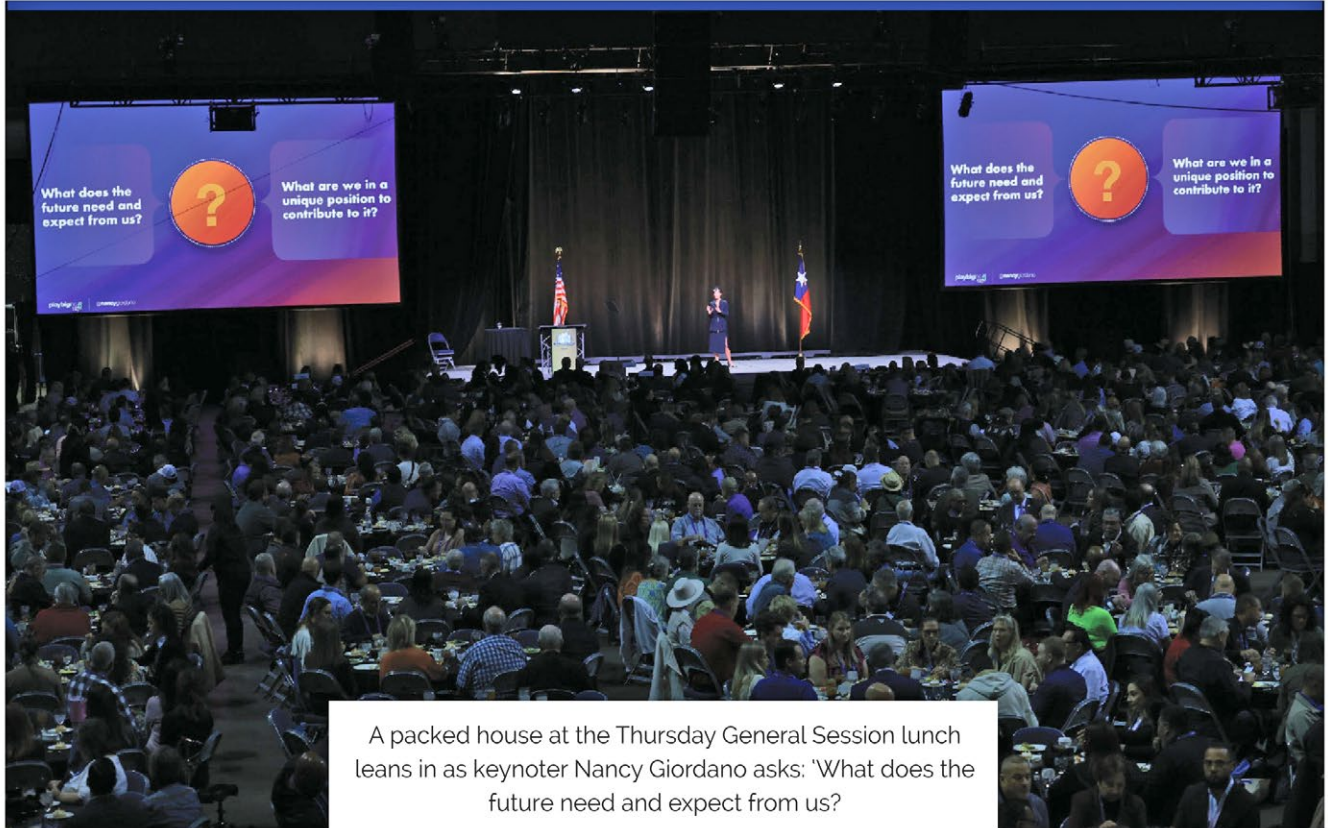
October and November are the best months to prepare your home for the sometimes-freezing South Texas winter. Wrap exposed pipes, insulate pipes that run along exterior walls, cover all outside spigots, and replace any damaged or missing weather strips. Other items to consider for your winter preparations include:

- Have your heating system inspected
- Install a carbon monoxide (CO) detector in your home
- Assure your smoke detectors are in good working order
- Clean out gutters and repair any roof leaks
- Have the chimney cleaned and inspected
- Have a safe alternative heating source at the ready

Think Before You Share: The Truth About Social Media “Warnings” and Chain Posts

Leon Valley residents frequently look out for one another, and that’s one of our community’s greatest strengths. But in today’s age of instant sharing, even well-intentioned posts can spread fear rather than facts. Recently, a Facebook story circulating in our area claimed that criminals were handing out business cards laced with a

drug called Burundanga to incapacitate victims at gas stations. The post was alarming—but not accurate.

What Really Happened?

According to verified information, no documented cases of this type of incident have occurred anywhere in the United States, including Texas. Variations of this same story have circulated online for years, each time without a single police report, investigation, or toxicology finding to support it.

National fact-checking organizations such as Snopes and WUSA9 VERIFY have examined these claims extensively. Their findings are clear: the story is unsubstantiated.

Experts in pharmacology also note that the method described simply isn’t scientifically plausible. A drug like scopolamine (sometimes called Burundanga) cannot be absorbed in dangerous amounts through brief skin contact with a paper card. It would require a dramatically different method of exposure.

Why These Posts Spread So Quickly

Social media makes it easy for dramatic stories to feel urgent and official. Many of these posts are intentionally written with emotional language or “copy-and-paste” formatting that encourages instant sharing. Unfortunately, when these false warnings gain traction, they:

- Create fear in neighborhoods
- Damage trust between citizens and police
- Cause unnecessary calls for service
- Distract from real safety issues that deserve our attention

How to Verify a Post Before Sharing

Here are a few quick steps to help protect yourself and your community from misinformation:

1. Check the source. Real police warnings come directly from official law enforcement pages, not anonymous posts or screenshots.

2. Verify before you forward. If something sounds alarming, confirm it through fact-checking sites like Snopes.com, FactCheck.org, or by reaching out to LVPD.

3. Look for missing details. If a post has no names, dates, case numbers, or agency contact information, it's almost always unreliable.

4. Avoid fear-based sharing. Sharing unverified information, even with good intentions, can spread unnecessary panic.

The Bottom Line

Public safety depends on accurate, trustworthy information. We appreciate how much our residents care about protecting loved ones—but we encourage you to pause before you share. If you ever see a post claiming to be an urgent police alert, take a moment to verify it.

When in doubt, call us. We're here to help. Spreading truth builds awareness. Spreading rumors builds fear. Let's choose awareness—together.
