Subject: RE: Rules of Decorum

Unfortunately I missed the live feed of the Jan 10 council meeting & the meeting where this had its first reading, so this is a moot point & the variance appears to have been approved but I wanted to comment on it for future reference & precautions .

It concerns the an Ordinance Granting a Zone Change to Patrick Christiansen on the acreage Located at 7213 Huebner Road from R-1 to R-6. The only discussion at the council meeting was about a traffic survey.

I HIGHLY RECOMMEND you also require a survey on how infrastructure will be affected, in particular on water & sewer & their costs if they have to be upgraded to meet the extra demand.

Mr. Orozco, this might interest you as you are neighbors to this proposed development.

There is a reason I decided to put my plan into effect of buying land & building my retirement home in the hill country a few years earlier than planned!

The city where I live & will continue to reside until the new house is completed is in Richwood Tx. Like a lot of Texas towns it has had a housing boom over the last 5 years. A developer came to town with a plan very similar to the one this developer has planned.

They had same sales pitch of creating bigger tax base resulting in lower taxes as this developer. After the fact, what we ended up with was an over worked water treatment plant & lower water pressure due to higher demand.

5 years later we have flooding problems, sewage back-up during high rain storms & home water pressure ½ of what it was 5 yrs ago.

Even after a tax payer household increase of over 15%, the tax payers now have property tax that have increased by 6.5% in the last year to pay for infrastructure improvements that should have been planned out & partially payed by the developers but wasn't. Developers ran off with the profits & city residents got hit with the bill!

Long story short, don't let these developers sell you the bill of goods they did the city of Richwood! Make sure **COMPLETE COMPREHENSIVE** infrastructure studies by independent studies are done first & paid for the developers NOT THE CITY!

Richwood did have pre-construction impact studies done, but guess who chose the companies doing the studies even though the city paid the fees?

FINAL THOUGHT!

I highly recommend you to do a survey of small towns going through growth booms & see if property taxes went up or down when construction completed!
